### Film

*13<sup>th</sup>*, 2016, American documentary by director Ava DuVernay. The film explores the “intersection of race, justice, and mass incarceration in the United States”; it is titled after the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, adopted in 1865, which abolished slavery throughout the United States and ended involuntary servitude except as a punishment for conviction of a crime.

*The Long Shadow*, 2017. Film-maker Frances Causey and producer Sally Holst, both daughters of the South, were raised with a romanticized vision of America's past. Haunted by the truth of slavery's legacy in their own histories, they passionately seek the hidden truth and the untold stories that reveal how the sins of yesterday feed modern prejudice, which burns undiminished despite our seeming progress.

*Just Mercy*, 2019

Theatrical feature film. True story that follows young lawyer Bryan Stevenson and his battle for justice as he defends a man sentenced to death despite evidence proving his innocence.

*True Justice: Bryan Stevenson's Fight for Equality*, 2020, HBO

Documentary. An intimate profile of pioneering lawyer/activist Bryan Stevenson, who has dedicated his life to fighting for equality in the criminal-justice system.
